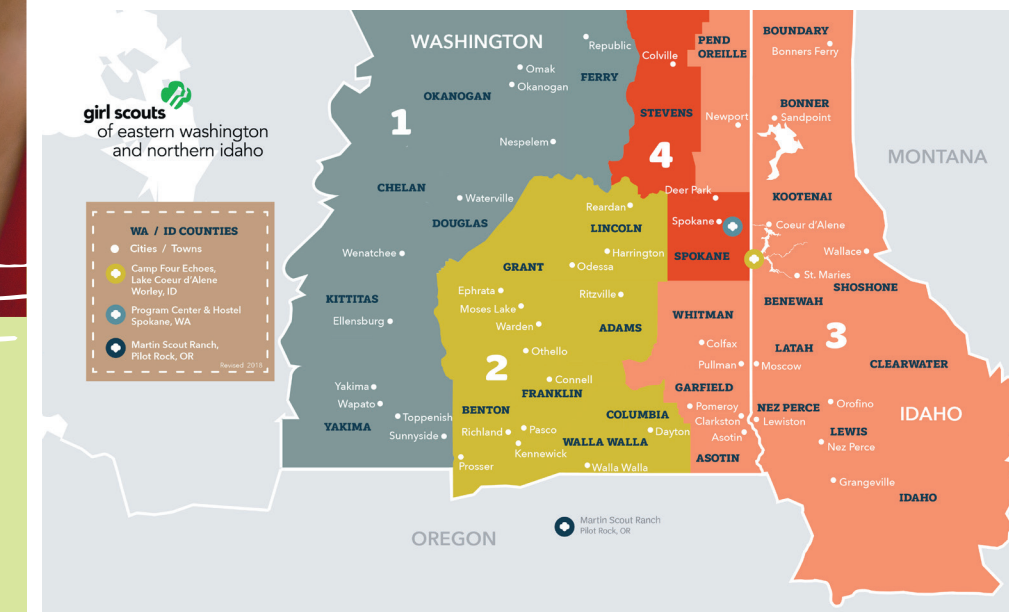


Family Guide to Girl Scouts

Who are Girl Scouts?

We are 2.6 million girls and adults who believe every girl can change the world. Our journey began more than 100 years ago with one woman, Juliette Gordon “Daisy” Low, who believed in the power of every girl. Today, we continue her legacy of building girls of courage, confidence, and character who make the world a better place.

Girl Scouts of Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho (GSEWNI) serves more than 3,000 girls in partnership with over 1,500 adult volunteers. The council region encompasses 65,000 square miles that includes 19 counties in Central and Eastern Washington and 10 counties in Northern Idaho.



What do Girl Scouts do?

At Girl Scouts, your girl will prepare for a lifetime of leadership, success, and adventure in a safe, no-limits place designed by girls, for girls.

How?

Through engaging, challenging, and fun activities like earning badges, going on trips, selling cookies, exploring science, getting outdoors, and doing community service projects.

At Girl Scouts, she'll lead her own adventure and team up with other girls to choose the hands-on activities that interest her most.

Along the way, your girl will gain important skills in four areas that form the foundation of Girl Scouts:

- STEM
- Outdoors
- Life Skills
- Entrepreneurship

The result?

A lifetime of leadership. Girl Scouts helps girls thrive in five key ways; she:

- Develops a sense of self
- Exhibits positive values
- Seeks challenges and learns from setbacks
- Forms and maintains healthy relationships
- Learns to identify and solve problems in her community.

Become a Volunteer

GSEWNI trains volunteers and gives support as necessary. You must be over 18 and willing to become a Girl Scout member, as well as pass a criminal background check. To get started, visit our website at: gsewni.org.



What do I Need to Know?

What is the cost?

The yearly Girl Scout membership fee is \$30 for girls, \$25 for adults.

Is a uniform required?

No, however, the Girl Scout uniform is an official vest, sash, or tunic worn with a white blouse and khaki bottoms, along with the insignia and Girl Scout pins. Though they are not required, we recommend that each girl have a vest, sash, or tunic to display their earned rewards, badges, and patches.

Is financial assistance available?

Yes! Assistance is available for girls and adults who need financial help in order to participate in the Girl Scout program. Assistance is available for membership registration, uniform components, a journey book, and camp.*

How do troops sustain themselves?

Girl Scout troops are funded by a share of money earned through council-sponsored product sale activities (such as Girls Scout Cookie sales) and troop money earning activities upon approval (i.e. car washes, craft sales, etc.). Some troops may require minimal troop dues for snacks and patches/badges.
