As I look back on my three years as your CEO, I will forever be grateful for three chapters of our Girl Scout rise. One is deep gratitude to the 2020 volunteers and Girl Scouts who preserved thru the marathon pandemic-ridden 2020 cookie season. Second is my deep appreciation to my 2021 Girl Scout staff, who battled back from us being over 20% down in membership to finish the year to near even. That victory is why we are so strong in 2022. And my third appreciation is to you all for making 2022 a year of possibilities. From so much new programming to fun-filled summer, spring, and winter camps to so many excited Daisies and Brownies from areas like Wenatchee and Wall Walla, to an expansive and growing outreach Go Getter program, our Girl Scouts are on the march.

Two years ago, at our annual meeting with our nation shut down and our cookies sequestered, we had come to a decision point: "Two roads diverged in a wood, and [we]—[we] took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference." We did move forward together in summer 2020, staff coming back to the office fall 2020, and never looking back. Our cookies sales percentagewise were #2 nationally last year, and our 2021 fall sale may have been #1 nationally, statistically speaking. Our most important metric, membership growth, remains healthy as well, with overall membership being #7 nationally and retention being #4. We cannot rest on our laurels if we want to ensure Juliette's dream is strong a decade from now when our Daisies, joining today, graduate from high school. There is only one Council of Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho, and I am confident as your CEO we can maintain our present momentum. To grow to new heights will require hard work and imagination. We are certainly a Council of unicorns and rainbows so that imagination exists here. The possibility is before us to be a Council of our dreams. This 2022 Annual meeting, I believe in our limitless possibility. I invite you to believe too. Peace....




