

## Highest Awards

### Bronze Award

The Girl Scout Bronze Award is the highest honor a Girl Scout Junior can achieve. As girls and their teammates plan and complete their project, they develop confidence and experience what it is like to work with other scouts for a common goal. Fifty-seven girls received the Girl Scout Bronze Award during the 2014-2015 Membership Year.

### Silver Award

The Girl Scout Silver Award is the highest award a Girl Scout Cadette can achieve. It gives girls the chance to demonstrate their leadership abilities. This award reflects organization, determination and dedication to improving one's community. Twenty girls received the Girl Scout Silver Award during the 2014-2015 Membership Year.

Sofia Martinez, from Troop 5330 in Prosser, WA is a recipient of the Girl Scout Silver Award. Sofia has Juvenile Batten Disease, which is a rare, fatal, neurodegenerative genetic disorder with no cure. Despite her condition, Girl Scouts has allowed her to become an inspiration to millions. Sofia founded the annual Shining Star Pageant for girls with disabilities. The pageant allows all girls the opportunity to take the stage and shine bright.

### Gold Award

The Girl Scout Gold Award represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. It recognizes girls in grades 9 - 12 who demonstrate extraordinary leadership through projects that have sustainable impacts in the community and beyond. Nine girls received the Girl Scout Gold Award during the 2014-2015 Membership Year.



## Girl Scouts and the Environment

GSEWNI partnered with the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality and the Coeur d'Alene Tribe to launch project **Restore the Shore** at Camp Four Echoes. Troop 3003 from Coeur d'Alene, ID helped plant a vegetative buffer that will enhance and protect the lake's water quality, stabilize the shoreline from erosion, and provide a filter for pollutants.

Girl Scout Lego robotics team, RoboGirls, completed a Take Action project pertaining to waste and its impact on our earth. After researching the negative effect plastic trash bags have on the environment, RoboGirls identified a more eco-friendly solution and revealed their findings to our staff at the Girl Scout store.
